## Curriculum Overview Spring Term Primary 1

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Literacy	Reading Working within their level, pupils in Primary 1 will:
	<ul> <li>Revise single letter sounds and learn digraphs such as 'ch', 'sh', 'oo', 'ee', 'th' and 'wh'.</li> <li>Start to develop confidence in blending and reading simple sentences independently.</li> <li>Recognise 'Red Words' (words that cannot be sounded out) such as 'of' and 'to'.</li> <li>Use signs, books and other texts to find information.</li> <li>Locate and point to useful signs in their environment and consider why they are important.</li> <li>Choose a favourite story and share why they like it and what the story is about.</li> <li>Explore events and characters in stories and pupils will have opportunities to retell stories through play.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Writing Pupils will: <ul> <li>Continue to take part in 'Funky Fingers' activities to help develop fine motor skills.</li> <li>Continue to develop letter and number formation skills in handwriting.</li> <li>Begin to construct simple sentences more independently using capital letters, finger spaces and full stops. Extend to writing 2 sentences for some.</li> <li>Continue to focus on who is in their story and where they are and begin to add detail showing what they are doing through drawing and writing.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Talking &amp; Listening Pupils will: <ul> <li>Have the opportunity to share stories with others.</li> <li>Recognise that some words are particular to the Scots language.</li> <li>Talk about what they know about Scotland and what they want to learn.</li> <li>Learn and recite a Scots poem and practise using a clear voice, expression and actions.</li> <li>Have the opportunity to share or perform their poem and share feedback about others recitations.</li> </ul></li></ul>
	<ul> <li>How You Can Help at Home</li> <li>Read stories to your child and ask them to sound out some of the words. You could also have a go at spotting some of the 'Red Words' that they know.</li> <li>Encourage recognition of words and texts in everyday settings.</li> <li>Practise their Scottish poem at home and help with performance skills.</li> </ul>
Numeracy	<ul> <li>Working within their level, pupils in Primary 1 will:</li> <li>Revise recognising numerals to 30.</li> <li>Identify missing numbers in a sequence forwards and backwards up to 20/30.</li> <li>Write numerals to 30 and beyond (for some)</li> <li>Add and subtract within 10 using different counting strategies.</li> <li>Count groups in a collection in different ways (1s, 2s, 10s) decide which has the most and which has the least.</li> <li>Understand the value of different coins and use money in play activities.</li> <li>Work out total cost to at least 10p.</li> <li>Begin to work out change from 10p.</li> <li>Read and use ordinal numbers in real life contexts to at least 10<sup>th</sup>.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>How You Can Help at Home</li> <li>Count with your child in everyday situations. Start on different numbers and practise counting forwards and backwards.</li> <li>When shopping discuss prices and coins used to pay for items.</li> <li>Play shops at home.</li> </ul>

	to understand their role within the group and begin to read simple notation.
